<p><b>Accessibility</b></p> <p>How easy it is for a person to learn, use, or do something. They might need tools and supports.</p>	
<p><b>Action</b></p> <p>When the work on a project creates change. It is meaningful to others.</p>

<p><b>Boundaries</b></p> <p>Differences in how you act with people based on how you know them.</p>	
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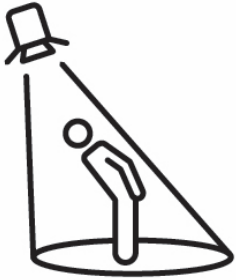
<p><b>Brainstorming</b></p> <p>When people share ideas about how to solve a problem.</p>

<p><b>Confidentiality</b></p> <p>When something is private between two people or groups. You may not share it with others.</p>	
<p><b>Collaboration</b></p> <p>Working together on a goal or task. Each person adds something to the team.</p>	
<p><b>Communication</b></p> <p>Talking and listening to each other. We may do this in different ways.</p>	



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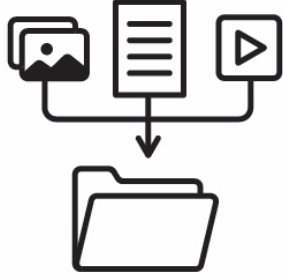
<p><b>Compensation</b></p> <p>What you get paid for the work you do. This can be money, gift cards, or something else.</p>	
<p><b>Contract</b></p> <p>An agreement people sign when they work on a project. It tells what each will do and what the work pays.</p>	
<p><b>Credit</b></p> <p>Naming the people who helped create a product. Everyone is praised for their work.</p>

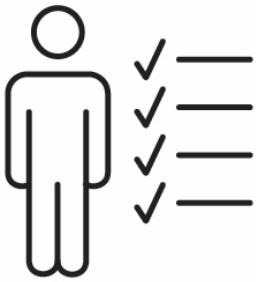


<p><b>Data Analysis</b></p> <p>Looking at the information you get in a project. Figuring out what it means.</p>	
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<p><b>Data Collection</b></p> <p>Gathering facts for your project. They can include words and numbers.</p>

<p><b>Eligibility</b></p> <p>Having the needed qualities to do a job. This can include skills and experience.</p>	
<p><b>Employee</b></p> <p>A person who stays at a company for a long time. They have more responsibility. They get more support.</p>	
<p><b>Ethics</b></p> <p>Rules your group agrees to follow to keep everyone safe and well.</p>

How the work you did changed things for others in small and big ways.






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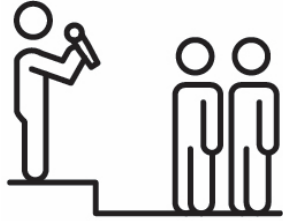
<p><b>Inclusion</b></p> <p>Having different people work on a project. You treat them as equals. You value their skills and experience.</p>	
<p><b>Informed Consent</b></p> <p>Understanding what you are asked to do. Then agreeing to do it.</p>	
<p><b>Interview</b></p> <p>Asking how people think or feel about something.</p>

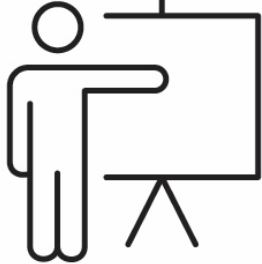
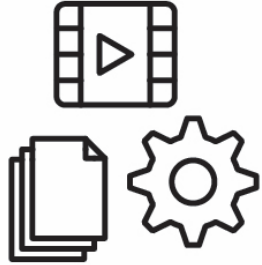
<p><b>Outcomes</b></p> <p>Things that happened because of the work you did.</p>	
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<p><b>Outreach</b></p> <p>Sharing your work with others. Telling how it will affect them.</p>

<p><b>Participatory</b></p> <p>When people work together on a project. They are from different backgrounds. Each person is valued.</p>	
<p><b>Presentation</b></p> <p>How you share your work and its impact. You might speak, write, or demonstrate it.</p>	
<p><b>Products</b></p> <p>The things you create as you do a project. This can include reports, tools, and more.</p>	



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<p><b>Public Benefits</b></p> <p>Support you get to meet your needs, like food and housing. This help often comes from the government</p>

<p><b>Recruitment</b></p> <p>Asking people to join your project. You try to find the right people for the job.</p>	
<p><b>Reflection</b></p> <p>Looking back at the work you did.</p>	
<p><b>Representation</b></p> <p>Showing many different kinds of people. Being seen and heard in all parts of life.</p>	







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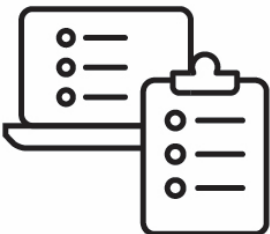
<p><b>Research</b></p> <p>Learning new things about a subject. You can learn in many ways like reading, drawing, or talking to others.</p>	
<p><b>Responsibility</b></p> <p>What you are expected to do in your work. This could include tasks and behaviors.</p>

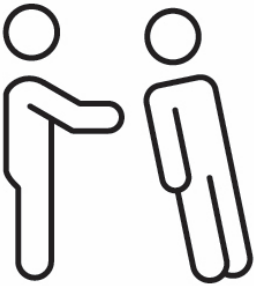
<p><b>Study Problems</b></p> <p>Issues that need to be solved by doing a project.</p>
